


COMPUTER SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING

Washington's dual-credit program prepares students for post-secondary education and professional licensure and/or certification for careers in specific **medical and health related fields**. Students in 8th and 9th grades from all districts may apply. The **Health Sciences Magnet** offers students the opportunity to participate in one of the most dynamic growth industries in the United States. Students receive broad-based preparation for careers in healthcare and scientific research through one of two program pathways as they pursue either a Core 40, Academic, or Technical Honors Diploma: Early College Program Partnered with Ivy Tech Community College, this is hands-on training and a rigorous course of study. This dual credit rich program leads to a health care specialist technical certificate. Students completing the program will sit for the NCHSE (National Health Science Assessment) exam and industry certification exams in EKG, patient care, or pharmacy technician.

With the **Project Lead the Way Biomedical Science Program**, students investigate the roles of biomedical professionals as they study the concepts of human medicine, physiology, genetics, microbiology, and public health. Students earn dual credit through the Project Lead The Way sequence and course study in anatomy and physiology while completing this nationally recognized program.

PRE-K & KINDERGARTEN INFORMATION

Pre-K

Preschool is now offered in the district! Students must turn age 4 **before August 1, 2022**, to qualify for Pre-K. These early childhood programs provide a safe, developmentally appropriate, nurturing environment that promotes a love of learning, positive self-image, and social, emotional, intellectual, and physical growth.

Enrollment includes a physical examination and required immunizations including:

- 3 Hepatitis B
- 4DTaP
- 3 Polio
- 1 Varicella (Chickenpox),
- 1 Measles, Mumps, and Rubella
- 2 Hepatitis A

A vision assessment/exam is required, along with a student emergency contact form and a dental exam. A work survey must also be completed by each family.

Kindergarten

In order to be eligible for **kindergarten** in the state of Indiana, your child must be five (5) years of age on or before August 1st. Children born between August 2nd and September 1st can apply for an eligibility waiver.

Waiver guidelines may be obtained by contacting the Office of Curriculum and Instruction at 393-6039.

Birth Record: The following records are required for enrollment:

- Birth certificate, baptismal certificate, or other official proof of birth
- Two proofs of residency (regular state ID, driver's license, rental lease, mortgage receipt, etc.)

School Forms: The following forms are required for enrollment:

- Registration form
- Health history
- Physical examination
- Dental examination
- Vision examination
- Emergency card
- Home Language Survey
- Migrant Work Survey

By law, your child needs the following immunizations:

- Polio
- Diphtheria
- Pertussis
- Tetanus (DPT)
- Mumps
- Measles
- Rubella
- Hepatitis A
- Hepatitis B
- Varicella (a parental written report of a child's history of chickenpox is acceptable).

Safety: For his/her own protection, your child should know:

• His/her full name • Address • Telephone number • The names of family members • If your child walks to school, please be sure you have taught him/her the correct route between home and school, using sidewalks and crossing streets at corners. Your child should use this route every day. In the city, crossing guards are at some street corners.

Transportation: Kindergarten children will be assigned to attend an elementary school (grades K-5) based on their home address. Transportation will be provided both to and from school for those kindergarten children who live outside the walkable area for their elementary school or for students who attend an elementary school because of a transfer option.

BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS

Bright Beginnings and **Kaleidoscope** are self-supported programs funded by parental fees, which are charged biweekly. SBCSC provides an in-kind contribution through the provision of school facilities.

- Social and academic growth and development are encouraged and supported.
- Intentional interactions with staff, students and parents create and foster a growth mindset environment.

Our goal is to create a stable environment that is inviting, comfortable, orderly, and manageable by the children. This includes active play, dramatic play, science, crafts, construction and other developmentally appropriate activities.

Bright Beginnings and Kaleidoscope are in session if/when school is in session. They are not available on 2-hour delay days or school holidays.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The South Bend Community School Corporation offers a continuum of services appropriate to meet the individual needs of each student. We believe that all students can learn and the path to excellence is different for each student. This is particularly true of the students with disabilities. Special education programming provides the support these students need to access their free and appropriate public education, and reach their full potential. Students with disabilities receive services through the Special Education Department in accordance with state and federal mandates. Students who qualify will have a Individualized Educational Plan (IEP) developed which determines educational services in the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE). CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Hundreds of students in South Bend schools have discovered that traditional college is not the only pathway to career success.

With SBCSC's **Career and Technical Education Program**, selection and registration begin sophomore year when students plan their junior year schedules with guidance counselors. Beginning junior year, CTE students attend class for half the day at their home high school, then are bussed to another location for the other half of the day. Training and instruction take place at one of the area high schools, Ivy Tech Community College, or another specialized location. Transportation is provided by SBCSC so students can make the most of these career training opportunities. SBCSC has partnered with local colleges and universities, businesses, and community organizations to ensure that the programs offered meet the academic and technical skills required for students to be successful and ready for the workforce upon graduating. If students decide that college is the direction they wish to pursue, any dual credits earned while in high school will put them a step ahead, both financially and academically.

CTE students have the option of earning dual credits, which means they will have both high school and college credits upon graduating. This gives them a head start on a college degree. Students can also earn industry certifications in specific fields, which position them to enter a given profession with a proven record of achievement. All SBCSC high school students are eligible to participate in all CTE programs offered at the four district high schools, regardless of their "home" high school.

The Adult Education (ADED) mission is to strengthen our community by inspiring lifelong learning and career advancement. Adult Education empowers adults to further their education and meet their career goals. Classes and trainings are offered at a variety of convenient times and locations.

ADED services are available to St. Joseph County residents, ages 16 and up. All classes are free and open to both high school graduates and non-graduates in the following areas:

- High School Equivalency (HSE) preparation
 - classes and testing at our center
 - Testing offered year-round
- English Language Learner (ELL) classes that provide opportunities for interested individuals who wish to improve their English skills in reading, writing, speaking and listening, while learning about American culture.
- Refresher classes for placement exams, such as Accuplacer or ASVAB.
- Trainings and certifications in a variety of virtual and in-person settings for regional, in-demand industries, such as:
 - Certified Medical Administrative Assistant (CMAA)
 - Quickbooks
 - CNC Machining
 - Logistics and Welding

HSE & ELL classes are held in combination with a HighScope early childhood program. In addition to taking classes, adult students interact with their children through Parent and Child Together (PACT) learning activities. Children from 6 months to kindergarten are welcome with their parent(s).

BILINGUAL SERVICES AND MIGRANT EDUCATION

The Bilingual Services and Migrant Education Department supports the Corporation's mission in assuring equal educational access for English Learners (ELs), immigrant, refugee, migrant, and bilingual students and their families.

We recognize that all stakeholders (students, parents, educators, community members, etc.) share the responsibility of ensuring that our students develop linguistic, cognitive, and academic skills to become competitive citizens of a global society.

We strive to ensure that all students are provided with the opportunity to participate in academically challenging programs that respect and build upon the unique cultural and linguistic attributes they bring to the learning community.

To these ends, the Bilingual Services Department provides the following services for students:

English Language Development Program:

English Learners (ELs) receive intensive English language development instruction by certified teachers trained to meet the unique needs of EL students. The program uses instructional methods based on educational theory and pedagogy to assist students in obtaining English language proficiency while meeting rigorous, grade-level academic standards.

Maritza Robles Dual Language Immersion Magnets:

The Spanish/English Maritza Robles Dual Language Immersion magnet is at McKinley Elementary and Harrison Elementary. Both programs are a 50:50 model whereby 50% of classroom instruction is taught in English and 50% in the target language. The three goals of the DLI magnet are academic excellence, bilingualism/biliteracy, and sociocultural competency.

Migrant Regional Service Center Region 1/Migrant Education Program:

This program promotes and provides quality academic and support services to migrant students within Region 1. We partner with multiple stakeholders to ensure that migrant students have access to quality opportunities to ensure academic success. STATE MANDATED TESTING

Indiana students are required to participate in certain state testing programs.

English Language Proficiency Assessments

The W-APT, WIDA Placement Test, is administered to all students for whom a language other than English is identified during the Home Language Survey process. The W-APT functions as a screener that is used for both initial assessment and English Language (EL) program placement of students who are identified as Limited English Proficient (LEP). This is administered upon enrollment. The WIDA ACCESS Annual Assessment is administered annually until the student attains a fluent score. The test window is January 9 - February 24, 2023.

IREAD-3 (grade 3) March 6-17, 2023

Based on the Indiana Academic Standards, the Indiana Reading Evaluation and Determination (IREAD-3) Assessment is a summative assessment that measures foundational reading standards through grade 3. By rule of the Indiana State Board of Education, promotion decisions must consider a student's ability to pass the IREAD-3 assessment. The assessment window is March 6-17, 2023.

ILEARN (grades 3-8, 10) April 17-May 12, 2023

ILEARN measures student achievement and growth in the subject areas of English/Language Arts, Mathematics, Science (Grades 4, 6 and HS*), and Social Studies (Grade 5). ILEARN reports student achievement levels according to the Indiana Academic Standards that were adopted by the Indiana State Board of Education.

* The high school science test is administered during students' Biology Course. The assessment window is April 17-May 12, 2023.

SCHOOL MEALS AND TEXTBOOK INFORMATION

The National School Lunch Program is a federally funded program that assists schools and other agencies in providing nutritious meals to children at reasonable prices. The National School Lunch Program provides meals that contain one-third of the recommended dietary allowance of necessary nutrients.

The Food and Nutrition Services Department carefully plans all meals in accordance with the USDA standards for calories, saturated fat, vitamins and minerals.

Allergies/Dietary Restrictions:

Students with food allergies or dietary restrictions will need a medical statement from a licensed physician before any changes are made to accommodate their dietary concerns.

Direct Certification:

Households that are directly certified will receive notification in early August and DO NOT have to complete a curricular material application. However, if you were not notified, it is recommended that an application be completed. Please know that in order to maintain this benefit and secure it for the future, it is important that families fill out these forms.

Breakfast Meals:

ALL schools receive breakfast meals at no charge.

Lunch Meals:

All schools receive lunch meals at no charge as part of the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP).

Meal/Textbook Applications:

All households are encouraged to complete the meal/textbook application in order to determine eligibility for free textbook assistance. The only exception would be those households that received a meal/textbook notification. Please go to the following website to complete the meal/textbook application: family.titank12.com. Only complete one application per household.

The information provided on the meal/textbook application and other benefits applications may also be used for other state and federally funded school benefits.

Prepayments of meals are encouraged and can be made by cash/check at the student's school or online at: family.titank12.com.

STUDENT SERVICES

We treasure the cultural diversity in our community and believe it is our social and moral obligation to ensure that every child achieves success and well-being.

Therefore the **Student Services Department** is focused on equity, diversity, and social-emotional development.

Through Student Services, parents can attend Family Literacy Nights, learn about and register for our MARVELous Summer Camps, enroll in 21st Century Scholars, and become further engaged in our district and community.

Brown Community Learning Center (BCLC), located at 737 Beale Street, is a full-service, district-wide community center. The Center serves as a hub of educational, recreational, cultural, health, and civic partnerships, which optimize the conditions for learning for children and the community. Formerly Brown Intermediate School, Brown Community Learning Center serves as the home of the Family and Community Engagement (FaCE) program. Through the FaCE program, we offer various courses designed to increase families' opportunities to improve their health, professional skills, and economic well-being.

Family and Community Engagement (FaCE) is a revised initiative led by the South Bend Community School Corporation. FaCE provides necessary information to parents in a way that is engaging, relevant to our parents' needs, and centered around student empowerment. FaCE provides our parents with free school and community-based workshops designed to engage and empower parents, students, and the entire district family.

The 21st Century Scholar Program is a tuition assistance program for the state of Indiana. Eligible families with 7th or 8th-grade students can apply online or with their school counselors. The program offers high school assistance in the form of the Scholar Success Program. Upon completion of the program and maintaining satisfactory high school credentials, students can receive up to four years of tuition and other mandatory fees paid for at participating Indiana colleges or universities.

The deadline to apply is June 30th of the student's 8th-grade year. Families are encouraged to attend our district-wide, 21st Century Scholar Nights to learn more about the program, participate in various educational activities such as college and career fairs, as well as receive assistance with the application process.

SchoolMessenger's Quick Tip allows students, staff, and parents to have a way to report issues and concerns. Quick Tip allows school personnel to receive tips immediately. They then have the ability to respond to issues that might impact the school or individual students in a timely manner. The tips may range from peer pressure to depression, school safety or bullying. Users can identify which school receives the tip, select an appropriate topic from the dropdown list, write the message, and submit the tip. Tips may be submitted anonymously. The Quick Tip link is on all the school websites. Users may access Quick Tip directly at quicktip.sb.school. "School Messenger Quick Tip" apps are also available for both iOS (App Store) and Android devices (Google Play). When launching the app for the first time, you will be prompted to enter the school district code: "sbccsc."




